



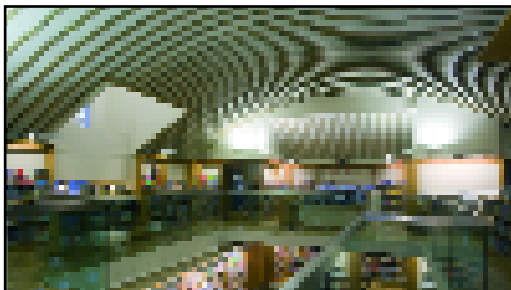
## Royal Institute of Architects of Ireland Award for Abbeyleix Library

Laois County Council was honoured recently when one of its public buildings, Abbeyleix Library, was bestowed with the prestigious Royal Institute of Architects of Ireland Award for the best Conservation/Restoration building of 2009. Mr John Gormley, Minister for the Environment, Heritage and Local Government, who also officially opened the library in June, 2008, presented County Manager Peter Carey with the award at the function held in Farmleigh House.

The library has been a tremendous success in its first year. The stock range consists of an eclectic mix of over 22,000 items to cater for all ranges of age and taste. Over 1,700 members have joined and the library has received over 40,000 visits. Over 45,000 items were

issued to its borrowers in the first year and some 1,800 people have also attended the 140 various events held so far in the library. The art gallery, which is incorporated into the design of the building, has hosted numerous exhibitions throughout the year and has become a very popular space with local artists who wish to exhibit there. The gallery supplements wonderfully the overall ethos behind any library, which is that of expanding the cultural viewpoint of the community.

Through the renovation and restoration of Abbeyleix Library, Laois County Council has raised the bar very high in terms of the standard and quality of public buildings in Ireland - a feat that the entire organisation should be extremely proud of.

***We are delighted to welcome the publication of the 2009 edition of the 'Our County' newsletter, which provides us with an opportunity to reflect on the progress made by Laois County Council over the past year.***

Our commitment to a customer-centred approach to service provision was enhanced by the opening of the new Area Office in Portarlinton in December, 2008. During the past year we also opened a new Fire

Station and Recycling Centre in Portarlinton. The Council continues to contribute positively to the quality of life of our communities through the successful operation of leisure complexes in Portarlinton and Portlaoise and the continuation of the playground and Libraries programme.

Laois County Council was also involved during the year in the organisation and promotion of events such as the Rose of Tralee Regional Finals, Magnet Festival, Electric Picnic and Gordon Bennett Rally. As well as enhancing the profile of the county, the hosting of such major festivals impacts positively on the local economy.

This is the first edition of the newsletter following the election of a new Council in June, 2009 and we would like to welcome the newly elected members of the Council. We would also like to take this opportunity to thank the outgoing Members for their hard work and dedication over the years and to wish them well in their future endeavours.

The term of office of the new Council commences at a time of major financial upheaval, at both national and local level. While there are difficult times ahead and difficult decisions to be made, we are confident that the Council can meet whatever challenges may arise.

It is also relevant at this time to reflect on the achievements of

the outgoing Council. While the term of the Council coincided with a period of significant development in County Laois, the financial benefits which accrued to the Council have been used to fund many key infrastructural and amenity projects throughout the county.

Examples include:

- Civic Plaza, Portlaoise
- Portarlinton and Portlaoise Leisure Centres
- Abbeyleix, Durrow and Mountmellick Libraries
- Playgrounds at Mountmellick, Durrow, Portarlinton, Stradbally, Clonaslee and Portlaoise
- Slieve Bloom Amenity, Linear Walk Portlaoise and The Swan Mini-pitch
- Road construction and improvement works throughout the county
- Footpaths, parking facilities and traffic calming schemes
- Portlaoise Main Drainage Scheme, Portarlinton Water Supply and many more water and waste water schemes around the county

We would like to thank all the elected members of the Council for their support and commitment over the past year. We also thank our dedicated staff for their ongoing efforts to provide the best possible service to our customers. We acknowledge the work of the business sector and community organisations throughout the county and despite the difficult times that lie ahead, we offer assurance of the Council's ongoing support for the development and improvement of County Laois.

The challenge facing the Council is to continue to provide leadership in the promotion and development of the social, economic and cultural life of the county, despite the changed economic circumstances. We are confident that Laois County Council is ready to meet the challenge.

### Áras an Chontae on Target for Climate Change

Following a number of energy saving initiatives, Áras an Chontae energy usage has decreased by 11% in 2009 compared to 2008. This is significantly better than the annual 3% target set out in the National Climate Change Strategy.

The measures have included replacement of Halogen lights with ultra energy efficient LEDs, car park lighting reduction, reduction in unnecessary indoor lighting, PC shutdowns, etc. At current levels, the energy reduction should improve our Building Energy Rating Certificate from an E1 to a D2. Staff awareness and co-operation will help ensure that we continue to make savings and continue to achieve our Climate Change targets.

A Hybrid Street Light was installed at Áras an Chontae by Portlaoise Enterprise Centre based Advanced Renewable Energy Ireland LTD (ARE). ARE's product collects solar and wind energy to power the standard street light fitting. In this case, the ultra low energy LED technologies have been installed, so that ultimately, this one lamp will be capable of powering up to 3 LED flood lights and making the car park totally self sufficient. This pilot project will help assess the suitability of renewable energy lighting systems that may reduce Public Lighting operating costs.



## Knockmay Development Project

Laois County Council is engaged in a multi-million euro re-development of the Knockmay area of Portlaoise. The area consists of six local authority housing estates built and occupied over a seventeen year period from 1980 to 1997.

Works include refurbishment of existing properties; construction of new properties and designing out features which contribute to anti-community behaviour, such as alleyways and vacant land.

The estates are being tackled in order of construction with the oldest, Oakleaf Place, being first. Work commenced in Oakleaf Place in May, 2008, and will be completed by the end of 2009. It is anticipated that work will commence in two further estates within the next three years. The project is funded by the Department of the Environment, Heritage and Local Government.



Another vital element of the Project is the Community Forum. The Forum was established in September, 2008, and meets on a quarterly basis. The Forum, which is independently Chaired, provides the residents with a space to discuss issues of importance with Laois County Council and the other statutory and voluntary service providers. In January, 2009, the Forum

elected two members of the local community, Patrice Doheny-Dunne and Mary Burns, to represent their interests on various committees associated with the project. Aidan McCane, Tenant Liaison Officer, may be contacted on (057) 8680626 with queries about the Community Forum.

Laois County Council, in partnership with the Community, is commencing work on the Knockmay Community Building. The building will comprise a shop, a Community Crèche, a Health Clinic, Laois County Council offices and the Knockmay Community and Family Resource Centre. Construction of the building is expected to commence towards the end of 2009 and will take approximately 18 months.

The building will provide local delivery of services, improve the security of the area and enhance the physical environment. The building is jointly funded by Laois County Council, The Family Support Agency, Pobal, The Department of the Environment, Heritage and Local Government and the H.S.E.

## Portarlington Fire Station

The new Portarlington Fire Station was officially opened by An Cathaoirleach, James Daly M.C.C., on 25th June, 2009.

Portarlington Fire Station is one of eight stations which provide the fire brigade service for Laois County Fire & Rescue Service throughout County Laois as well as covering part of County Offaly adjoining Portarlington.



The construction of the station was funded by the Department of the Environment, Heritage and Local Government. Construction work started in December, 2007 and was completed in November, 2008 by contractors Joseph Doolan Ltd.

This new state of the art facility replaces the old fire station which was built in the 1950's. Included in this new facility are:

- 2 appliance bays
- A lecture room
- A drill yard with hydrants and underground storage tanks for hose drills.
- Drill tower for ladder and rescue drill
- Compressor for refilling breathing apparatus cylinders
- Drying facilities for protective clothing
- Station and toilet facilities

## Rose of Tralee Regional Finals 2009

The Regional Finals of the Rose of Tralee 2009 took place on the June Bank Holiday weekend in Portlaoise. Roses representing counties from all over Ireland and their families and friends participated in the festival which was a great success with glorious weather throughout. On the Friday, a Cathaoirleach's reception took place on the Civic Plaza at Áras an Chontae to welcome the Roses, the Rose Committee and the International Rose of Tralee, Aoife Kelly, to County Laois. This year, for the first time, pupils from first class in National Schools all over Laois participated in the festival as 'Rosebuds' and were twinned with County Roses. The School of Music and the school choir from Scoil Mhuire Portlaoise performed during the Reception.

An open air concert with the Portlaoise Gospel Choir and activities for Families was held on the Civic Plaza. The Regional Finals took place in the Portlaoise Heritage Hotel on Saturday and Sunday night, hosted by Ray d'Arcy. The overall winners who competed in the International Finals were Waterford, Kilkenny, Tipperary, Sligo, Cavan and Armagh. ## Laois International Golf Challenge 2009

The 2009 Laois International Golf Challenge took place from the 18th to the 21st May and attracted golfers from all over Europe, particularly from Northern Ireland, England, Wales and Sweden. The event ran very smoothly with all of the golf courses in Laois participating. There were individual prizes for each of the Golf Clubs during the week and overall prizes for



the Final and the runner up Day at Portlaoise Golf Club. The prizegiving ceremony was held in the Clubhouse of the Heritage Golf & Spa Resort at Killenard. The overall Prize winners this year were Warren Davies and Marc Hughes from Wales. The winners of the best International Player Prize were Ollie McNally and Hugh Casey from Northern Ireland.

## Gordon Bennett Irish Classic Car Run

The Gordon Bennett Irish Classic Car Run 2009 also took place over the June Bank Holiday weekend. Over 160 cars took part, mostly from overseas. A Cathaoirleach's Reception took place on Friday evening at Áras an Chontae to welcome all the visitors, particularly those from overseas, to County Laois. The participants drove the historic Gordon Bennett Route during the weekend as well as driving the Laois Heritage Trail. This year, the festival worked with the local Rose of Tralee Committee and helped in organising the Gala Parade on Saturday of the Bank Holiday weekend.



## Magnet Festival, Portlaoise

The Magnet Festival is a new community driven festival which took place in Portlaoise over the August Bank Holiday weekend. A great variety of acts participated including The Sharon Shannon Big Band with Shane Mc Gowan, Damien Dempsey and Dessie O'Halloran, Michael English as well as Declan O'Rourke, The Wolfe Tones, Jack L, Liam O' Maonlai and a superb Country Music evening with artists such as Mike Denver, Ray Lynam and Damien Bowe. The festival was staged at different venues around Portlaoise, such as the Portlaoise Heritage Hotel, Sky Venue, the Dunamais Arts Centre, two street stages and the Portlaoise Leisure Centre.

## Vincent Van Gogh Project

Stuart Dunne, actor and artist, better known as criminal Billy Meehan from RTE's Fair City, re-enacted the last 70 days of Vincent Van Gogh's life in the run up to the festival. His project 'VINCENT: Questioning the Method' was filmed in Portlaoise where Stuart painted a picture a day in his studio at 25 Church Street Portlaoise. The project reached its climax on 29th July when the character died. The following day, the start of the Magnet Festival, Stuart Dunne while in character, was waked in Grellan Delaneys Pub.

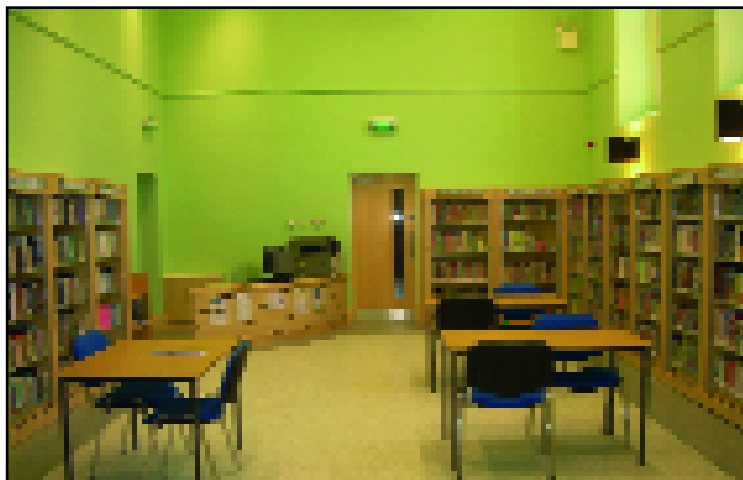

The National Parks and Wildlife Service organised a special dawn bat watching event at Emo Court, courtesy of the Office of Public Works, on 22nd May, 2009 at 4.30 a.m. The Dower House at Emo contains a Soprano Pipistrelle roost of over 300 bats.

A Dawn Watch was held, to show people the bats gathering at dawn to swarm before re-entering the roost. This was a unique opportunity for the public to experience this great wildlife spectacle.

Bat experts from Scott Cawley and Associates and National Parks and Wildlife Service staff were on hand to provide information and answer questions about the bats.

Richard Jack of Coillte led a guided walk at Glenbarrow in the Slieve Blooms on 22nd May, while Laois County Council and Knockmay Family Resource Centre hosted an afternoon of wildlife fun on the same day. This was aimed at Families and Young Children and was very well attended.

The annual Dawn Chorus walk was held at Brittas Lake in Clonaslee, with thanks as always to Coillte, on Sunday 24th May at 4.00 a.m.

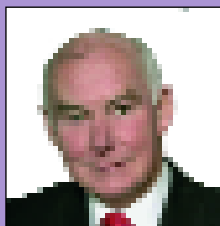

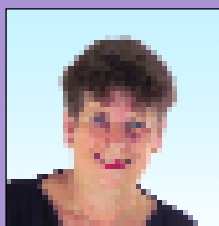

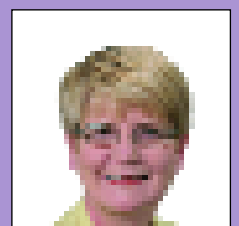

## Portarlinton Recycling Centre



Portarlinton Recycling Centre was officially opened on 25th June, 2009, by An Cathaoirleach James Daly M.C.C. This Recycling Centre was 75% funded by the Department of the Environment, Heritage and Local Government and is an objective of the Regional Waste Management Plan 2005 – 2010 for County Laois, where it is hoped to provide a total of 3 Recycling Facilities in the lifetime of the plan.

This facility was constructed by Noel Regan & Sons (Plant

Hire) Ltd., and is being run by AES, who successfully obtained the service contract for a 2 year period.

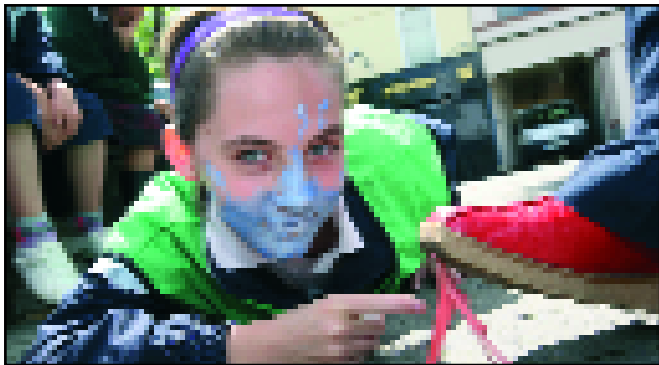
The importance of recycling and managing our waste in a sustainable fashion is increasingly important. It is imperative for Laois County Council to provide such high quality facilities to allow householders recycle as much material as possible. We are already at 36% recycling regionally and the provision of additional facilities like this one will improve on this rate. There is a €3.00 charge to use this facility.

Laois County Council is fully committed to the development and upgrading of recycling facilities throughout the county.

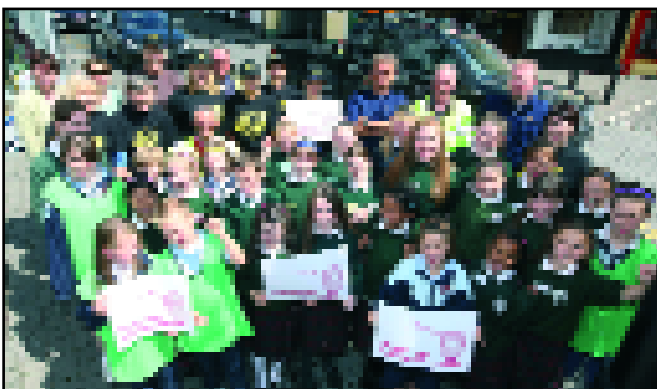


## By Gum!

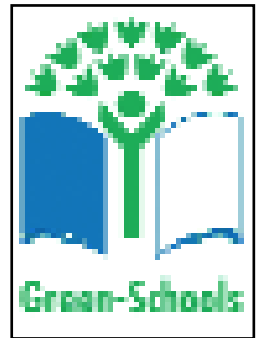

## Paws for thought



Did you know that when your dog does its business – it's your business!

Under the Litter Pollution Act 1997 - 2003, dog owners are legally obliged to clean up after their pets if they go to the toilet in public places e.g. on the street, in a park.

If you do not clean up after your pet, you are liable to receive an on-the-spot fine of €150, which if it is not paid, means you can be brought to Court, which can lead to a prosecution with a much larger penalty.

## Comhairle na nÓg 2008

Comhairle na nÓg was held on 13th November, 2008 in Portlaoise College. Approximately 180 fifth year and transition year students from eleven of the twelve secondary schools in Laois, along with pupils from Youth Reach in Mountmellick, participated on the day, assisted by a number of facilitators.

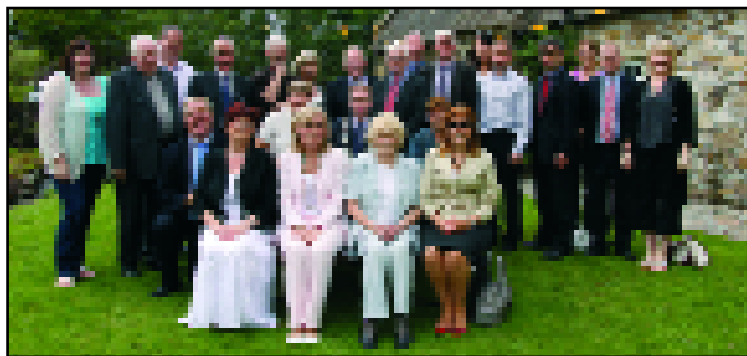
In 2008, over 100 entries representing cities, towns and villages throughout the Republic of Ireland and Northern Ireland were nominated by their local authorities to take part in the competition.

#### **Population Category 1: 0 - 200 population Camross Village**

As Camross celebrates the 100th year of their National School and the 150th anniversary of Camross G.A.A., along with hosting the Laois Fleadh 2009, the community of Camross have entered the Pride of Place competition to showcase this hive of activity at the foot of the Slieve Blooms.

The people of Camross are very proud of their people, their long standing and successful GAA tradition, their music and dancing, their heritage and their new community centre and youth café, all set against the beautiful backdrop of the Slieve Bloom Mountains.



#### **Housing Estates Category Riverview Portlaoise**

Riverview Housing Estate is a local authority estate with 18 apartments. The residents moved into their new homes in October 2002. It is a unique housing estate in that the majority of the residents are Senior Citizens. The estate itself is one of the most attractive areas to live with a beautifully landscaped communal garden and fabulous flowers in bloom every year. Donaghmore Workhouse & Agricultural Museum is a unique attraction in County Laois, and aims to tell the story of the families who lived and died within the Famine Workhouse walls before, during and after the Great Famine. The Museum uses guided and self-guided tours combined with various exhibits and pageants to explain the socio-economic conditions which led to the establishment of this and other Workhouses.

Visitors to the Museum will also enjoy an agricultural collection made up of a wide range of artefacts donated by local people, ranging from farm implements, household items and hand tools located in one of the two buildings that make up the Donaghmore Workhouse & Agricultural Museum. The committee are very proud of such a valuable and authentic asset in the South Laois region and are delighted to bring it to a national audience through the Pride of Place competition.



### Fusion Intercultural Family Day

The 2009 Fusion Intercultural Family Day took place on 1st August in Portlaoise Leisure Centre. This event is organized jointly by Laois County Council, Laois Partnership and Laois Sports Partnership. A large number of families attended the event, children were treated to a host of fun activities including games, dance, arts and crafts, face painting, hair braiding, free swimming sessions and bouncing castles.

In keeping with the intercultural theme, African bands performed for the visitors at the Leisure Centre. Ethnic groups from nine different nationalities cooked and supplied the food on the day.

### Laois Local Drugs Network

To assist the work of the Midland Regional Drugs Task Force, a Local Drugs Network Committee has been established in the county. The committee will work to raise awareness of combating substance abuse within the county with a multi agency approach.

The committee have put together a work programme for 2009 and have received funding from the Midland Regional Drugs Task Force to implement the actions in the plan.

### Laois School of Music Durrow

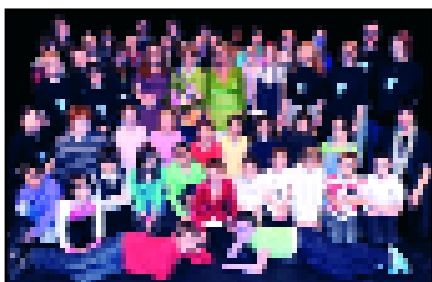
A new centre of The Laois School of Music opened in Durrow in November, 2008. 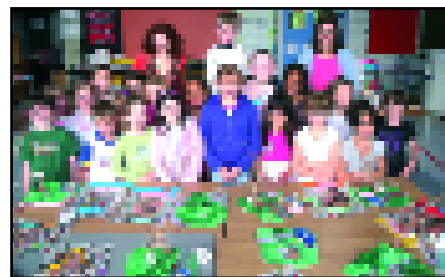
### Leaves

The Summer Arts Programme included a total of 18 different week long workshops designed for children and young people.

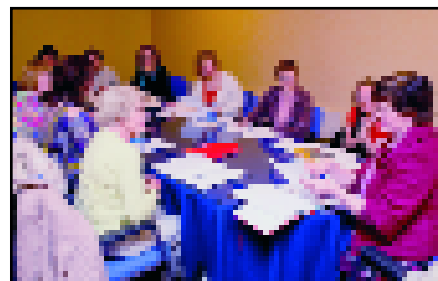

### Bealtaine Festival Events – in association with Age and Opportunity

May, 2009 was a very busy month with Bealtaine Festival Events taking place. The programme included storytelling sessions with Liz Weir, performances of a Scottish and Irish Music and Dance Show with John Davidson and Aishling Walsh and performances by the Laois ICA Choir for the patients, outpatients and staff of Abbeylisk Hospital and Day Care Centre, St. Brigid's Hospital Shaen and St Vincent's Hospital, Mountmellick.



The Laois School of Music Orpheus Orchestra performed for the active retirement group 50 Plus in the Parish Centre, Portlaoise, and Creative Writing workshops were held with writer Jean O'Brien for members of the Ballinakill Active Retirement Group.

In June last the Health and Safety Authority published their 2008 Annual Report and Statistics Report - here is a flavour of some of the key findings:

- The number of work related deaths was 57 compared to 67 in 2007.
- There were 6 non-worker fatalities, 4 of these were children.
- Over a third of work related deaths occurred in agriculture even though it employs just 6% of the workforce.
- 7,658 non-fatal accidents were reported
- The most common accident triggers remain manual handling and slips, trips and falls.
- HSA carried out 16,009 inspections.
- 14% of inspections resulted in enforcement action.
- 54% of inspections resulted in written advice and guidance.
- In 2008 fines totalling over €2.5 million were imposed for breaches of health and safety law.

The vast majority of fatal accidents could easily be prevented by implementing good safety practices in the workplace.

Taking a few simple steps such as planning the work activity, not taking shortcuts, maintaining and using the correct plant and equipment etc. can greatly reduce the risk of accidents.

During last August, the Health & Safety Authority stated that almost 60% of farmers had not completed a Farm Safety Code of Practice and they called on farmers to take "personal responsibility" for their safety.

The Authority stated that they will now begin to prosecute farmers and that the "softly softly approach" was over. Farming consistently accounts for a third of all workplace deaths annually and up to 1,800 serious injuries take place in the sector each year.

Teagasc will provide 100 half-day courses around the country to assist farmers to complete the Farm Safety Code. Farmers should contact their local Teagasc office for details.

**It is important to remember that thinking and acting safely does not stop when you finish work, as many of us conduct high risk activities in our everyday lives, from driving, gardening and DIY to playing contact sports. In addition, we need to be vigilant against the risk of fire in our home - so the message clearly is to Put Safety First by simply Thinking and Acting Safely at all times.**

## Register of Electors

The Draft Register of Electors 2010/2011 is published on 1st November. It is your responsibility to ensure that you are included on the Register.

### REMEMBER

#### IF YOU ARE NOT REGISTERED YOU CAN'T VOTE

You can check if you are included on the current Register at your local Post Office, Garda Station, Health Centre or Library, at [www.checktheregister.ie](http://www.checktheregister.ie) or by contacting the Corporate Affairs Department

If you are not included on the Register you can make a claim for inclusion on the 2010/2011 Register up to 25th November, 2009.

To qualify for inclusion you must be 18 years of age or reach 18 years by 15th February, 2010, be ordinarily resident on 1st September, 2009, at the address at which you wish to be registered and ensure that you are not registered as an elector at any other address.

Special voting arrangements apply in the case of Electors who are ordinarily resident in a hospital or nursing home and Electors who have a physical illness or physical disability and who wish to vote from home.

Electors who may not be able to attend a Polling Station due to circumstances of occupation/education can also apply for inclusion on the Postal Voters list.

Application forms for inclusion on the Postal and Special voters lists are also available from Corporate Affairs and must be completed and returned on or before 25th November, 2009.
